- 3.3.2 Jim Larkin agus Arm Cathartha na hÉireann

Chuir Larkin leis an Éirí Amach go hindíreach trí aird a dhíriú ar an easpa ceartais shóisialta agus ar chruachás oibrithe sa chóras reatha. Bhí tionchar díreach aige chomh maith i mbunú Arm Cathartha na hÉireann.

Rugadh James ('Big Jim') Larkin (1874-1947) i Learpholl do thuismitheoirí Éireannacha. D'oibrigh sé mar eagraí don National Union of Dock Labourers i Learpholl agus ó 1907 go 1909 i mBéal Feirste. Ní raibh brainse Bhéal Feirste eagraithe go maith agus bhí go leor seicteachais ann. D'éirigh le Larkin an t-aontas a athbheochan a bhuí lena chumas eagraíochtúil agus lena óráidíocht. Nuair a rinne na fostóirí iarracht srian a chur le cumhacht an cheardchumainn trí frithdhúnadh a imirt ar an lucht oibre agus fir oibre eile nó 'blacklegs' a thabhairt isteach ina n-áit, ghéill ceannaireacht an Cheardchumainn sa Bhreatain. Aistríodh Larkin go Baile Átha Cliath mar a bhunaigh sé an National Union of Dock Labourers (NUDL).

Chuir ceannaireacht an cheardchumainn Larkin ar fionraí de dheasca a chur chuige míliteach i leith chaidreamh oibreachais. Is ansin a bhunaigh sé Ceardchumann Iompair agus Ilsaothair na hÉireann. I mí na Bealtaine 1911 d'fhoilsigh sé an nuachtán 'the Irish Worker' ina ndéantaí ionsaithe fíochmhara ar an gcaipitleachas, ar an impiriúlachas, ar na fostóirí agus ar Pháirtí Parlaiminteach na hÉireann, go dtí gur cuireadh cosc air sa deireadh de bharr a sheasaimh in aghaidh cogaí. Toisc an úsáid a bhain sé as stailceanna bhí sé i gcoinbhleacht oscailte leis na fostóirí. Sa bhliain



1913, mar fhreagra ar na héilimh a bhí aige ar chainteanna chun pá agus coinníollacha a phlé, tháinig nach mór ceithre chéad fostóirí le chéile chun an Employers' Federation a bhunú. D'eagraigh an Chónaidhm ansin go gcuirfí frithdhúnadh i bhfeidhm ar na hoibrithe sin nach dtabharfadh geall nach rachfaidís isteach i gceardchumann. Bhí ní ba mhó ná 20,000 oibrí (agus 80,000 eile ag brath orthusan) rannpháirteach. Níor bheag an t-achrann a lean, lena n-áirítear ruathar bataí a thug na póilíní faoi na hoibrithe agus faoin lucht féachana ar Shráid Uí Chonaill. Cuireadh Larkin i bpríosún ar feadh tréimhse.

Ar an 19 Samhain 1913 bhunaigh Larkin agus Séamus Ó Conghaile Arm Cathartha na hÉireann mar fhórsa cosanta na n-oibriththe ar lámh láidir Phóilíní Chathair Bhaile Átha Cliath. Bhí thart faoi 350 ball, a raibh a bhformhór díobhsan ina mbaill de cheardchumann éigin. Bhí éide suaithinseach dá chuid féin ag an bhfórsa agus rinne siad a gcuid traenála go hoscailte; bhí roinnt gunnaí faighte faoi rún acu a coimeádadh i gceanncheathrú an ITGWU i Halla na Saoirse, gar do Theach an Chustaim. B'ann don Arm Cathartha i gcónaí ámh fiú tar éis do na hoibrithe géilleadh agus do Larkin imeacht go dtí na Stáit Aontaithe go luath sa bhliain1914. Ba é Ó Conghaile a bhí ina Cheannfort; ina dhiaidh sin bhí Michael Mallin ina Cheann Foirne agus ba é a bhí i gceannas le linn Éirí Amach 1916.





The Irish Women Workers' Union was launched in Sept. 1911 with Larkin as president and his sister Delia as secretary. (LOP 113/123).



Letter by Larkin appointing James Connolly in his place if he were to be arrested, 30 Aug. 1913. (Ms. 15,679).



### Jim Larkin agus Arm Cathartha na hÉireann 3.3.2

ME 15673 (1)	
AN IRISH WORKERS' ARMY.	
The need has arisen for the embodiment of a disciplined force of the workers of Ireland,	
(1) To defend the country against foreign aggression;	
(2) To defend the workers against attack during labour disputes;	
(3) To assert and maintain the rights of the workers as citizens; and	
(4) To support the movement towards the establishment of a Workers' Republic.	
It has been decided that steps shall be taken at once to enrol	
such a force throughout Ireland. For this purpose a temporary Committee has been formed consisting of five representatives of the Irish Citizen Army, and five representatives of the Trade Union movement.	
Every member of the proposed Workers' Army shall be, wherever possible, a member of a Trade Union recognised by the Irish Labour Party and Trade Union Congress. A beginning is to be made by the enrolment in each local area of a nucleus of reliable men, preferably those who are already trained.	
When a sufficient number of local units has been formed a representative Convention will be called together in Dublin to put the organisation on a permanent basis.



# **Transcript**

## The Irish Citizen Army

Objects and aims of Citizen Army fully explained to those attending. Attendance numbered twenty-two. Evident interest displayed by all. General opinion expressive of possible development.

### Drill

No facilities for drill in Union rooms, suggested field in which Volunteers drill, controlled by Kingstown Council, should be utilised. Doubts held as to whether Citizen Army would get use of it, advice asked for as how best to act. Tom Clark: Sherlock, Vaughan L.L.D.

### **Uniforms**

A strong desire exists for a number of uniforms as soon as possible. Some men have already paid money off same. Think this would aid in gathering recruits.

## **Public Meeting**

General feeling that a public meeting should be held some Sunday, soon, with parade of Dublin Company of Citizen Army. General impression this would cause a rally. It is felt that one imperative feature of the meeting should be Jim Larkin's attendance.

# **Antagonistic Forces**

Volunteers very shaky here, divisions appearing.

### **Personal Remarks**

A fine yard attached to Union Rooms, which could easily be converted into a commodious hall with a comparatively small expenditure. Believe this would appreciably add to the development of the Union's activities.

Before leaving a small committee was elected to attend to details.
