Phillips Maps

Introduction

The manuscript and early printed maps collections of The National Library of Ireland (NLI) include a number of maps, plans and surveys illustrating seventeenth century defensive mapping. Of these, MS 3137 and MS 2557 date from ca 1685, and are surveys of Irish fortifications carried out by the English military surveyor, Thomas Phillips (1635?-1693), Second Engineer. Thomas Phillips submitted his survey recommendations to George Legge, first lord Dartmouth (c.1647-91), former Governor of Portsmouth, and Master General of the Ordnance.

Lord Dartmouth had proposed that Commissioners be sent from England to Ireland to survey the Stores and Forts with a view to securing the Kingdom of Ireland against attack or invasion. Thomas Phillips had previously received a number of commissions from Lord Dartmouth, including work at Tangiers and Portsmouth. Once completed, Thomas Phillips's Irish survey was submitted by Lord Dartmouth to The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, James Butler, first duke of Ormond (1610-88). The Lord Lieutenant submitted the Survey to the Privy Council in 1685, but the proposals were not implemented.

We believe we have now identified which set of maps belongs together, and which series follows the other. We have also listed the printed maps that are included with MS 3137, not previously recorded by R. J. Hayes in the *Manuscript Sources for the History of Irish Civilisation.*¹ These maps are from Sir William Petty's *Hiberniae Delinatio*, first published in 1685 and so are contemporary with Thomas Phillips's survey. Finally, we have enclosed a table comparing the surveys, maps and drawings of MS 3137 with MS 2557, plus a copy list of the original proposed contents of the survey.

MS 3,137

In 1935, the Library at Kilkenny Castle presented the Thomas Phillips survey at MS 3,137, formerly MS 660, as a gift to the NLI. Originally a large volume, this series is now a set of 45 unbound maps, plans and surveys. MS 3.137 seems to be the original set produced by Thomas Phillips and presented by

Lord Dartmouth to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, the Duke of Ormond. Twenty-eight sheets bear the signature 'Thomas Phillips' and No. 19 was signed twice. Fourteen exhibit 'pricking', a means by which exact originals would have been produced from this set of maps. All of the 'pricked' examples depict building structures, usually fortifications, except for one that relates to the manufacture of booms.² Thomas Phillips recommended that strong "Boomes" or "Stopps" be placed at the "entrances to the most considerable harbours" to secure them.³

The script used for the titles is boldly written on the back of each page in brown iron gall ink, with flourishes in ornate script.

Eleven printed maps of escheated lands in Ireland are interspersed with the manuscript military survey. These printed maps are from the Cromwellian Sir William Petty's atlas of Ireland, *Hiberniae Delineatio*, first published in 1685. When the survey in MS 3,137 was listed in the *Manuscript Sources for the History of Irish Civilisation* these printed maps were omitted.⁴ A full list of the survey in MS 3,137 is included in Appendix I.

MS 2,557

Before it came to the NLI, MS 2,557 was part of the Ormond Collection⁵. It was originally in folio format. The original binding has now been disbound, conserved and the 95 sheets rebound. Sheets three to five are currently out of their original numeric sequence. The maps, plans and surveys are now housed separately from their original folio volume.

This volume is entitled *Rules Orders and Directions for Regulateing the Office* of the Ordnance in Ireland. Together with exact Surveys of the Cheife Harbours, Forts, and Fortifications, in the said Kingdom, & Estimates of y^e Charge for Fortifying y^e most Important Places therein. Originally each survey map would have accompanied by its schedule in the volume of estimates for the works proposed. This volume is marked as a "copie". It is not known currently how many copies were produced.

The surveys of MS 2,557 were executed *By directions of his Ma^{tie} King Charles the Second unto ye Right Hon^{ble} George Lord Dartmouth, M^r Generall of his Majesties Ordnance in England; and performed by Thomas Phillips. Anno 1685.*

MS 2,557 contains a twelve page manuscript copy, possibly copied by the Ordnance Clerk Robert Alloway. The copy is of Charles II's Order of 24th

August 1684, signed at the court at Whitehall on 24th March 1685/6. Under the terms of the Order, Thomas Phillips (Engineer) and Francis Povey (late Storekeeper at Tangiers) were to join with William Robinson (Surveyor and Storekeeper, Ireland) as Commissioners, and with Robert Alloway (Clerk of the Ordnance). They were firstly to survey "the Ordnance Amunition, Armes and other Habilliaments of War in the Severall Magazines" and then to compare this survey with that of William Robinson's of 25th March 1684. The duties of the engineer Thomas Phillips were outlined as taking "an Exact view of the Severall Forts, castles and Guerrisons" indicating their present condition, what might be necessary in terms of repairs and alterations, and also providing estimates of any such repairs, plus estimates of any costs in fortifying each place.

A folio page follows entitled *An Abstract of all the Ordnance in his Majesties Kingdom of Ireland* detailing the Brass Ordnance (one page) and the Iron Ordnance including the Iron Ordnance covered in Brass (one page).

This copy indicates that Thomas Phillips duly completed and submitted the work as commissioned, to Lord Dartmouth. In his submission to the Lord Lieutenant and Council, Lord Dartmouth urged that the recommendations of his Engineer be accepted, and that any "Stores as are wanting by the Severall Store Keepers be by them made good or to pay money for the same", that unserviceable stores were to be sold and the money applied to other repairs, and that "all disproportioned Brasse-Guns be sent to England and recast". The Lord Lieutenant was to forward Lord Dartmouth's Report and "return the whole with this booke to England".

It was Thomas Phillips's recorded view that of all the places he surveyed, only four or five were in any condition to be to be fortified: "the rest though formerly accounted strong by being encompassed with boggs & rivers, are now become otherways by reason that the boggs are now dryed up & more bridges made to passe the Rivers". In the Abstract of the content of a Book of Draughts & Designes for Fortifying the Kingdom of Ireland, Thomas Phillips recommended that it was "absolutely necessary" that Dublin, Waterford River and Passage, Cork, Kinsale, Limerick and Scattery Island, Galway, Athlone, Derryworragh instead of Charlemont, Culmore for Londonderry, Carrickfergus. and Belfast, "be fortified out of hand". The fortifications should be strong enough to "resist a considerable army". The associated estimated costs were between £554,116:59:0 and £557,515:10:0. These estimates included "all manner of Accidents, Incident Charges, Sallaries, and Freight". The estimated cost for fortifying Dublin, Waterford River and Passage, Kinsale, Limerick, Derryworragh, Culmore was £331,136:9:0, while the estimates for Cork harbour, "the most considerable Port in the South Pt. of the Kingdom", were £14,198:0:0.

It appears that it was anticipated that a number of copies of the *Booke of the Survey of Ireland*, as MS 2,557 could rightly be called, would be made. Producing those copies might have been part of Robert Alloway's duties. A manuscript list in MS 2,557 outlines the proposed content for "each Booke of the survey of Ireland" (see Appendix III). It appears from this listing that the William Petty maps were intended to be included with the Survey copies.

MS 2,557 consists of thirty-six Survey maps, of which Numbers 2 and 27 are currently unaccounted for. It is not certain whether these maps were ever received by the NLI. There aren't any printed maps in MS 2,557. Four of the maps, numbers 6, 8, 35 and 36 are still attached to their paper guards, which would originally have been used to bind them into the volume.

We think that MS 2,557 is a copy of MS 3137. In our opinion, the execution of the maps, plans and surveys in MS 2,557 is generally less fine than those in MS 3,137. The titles were written less ornately, in black ink. Having examined the paper and watermarks, we are not certain whether MS 2,557 was produced in 1685.

Most of the titles are duplicated across MS 2557 and MS 3137, with slight variations in spelling/wording. See Appendix II for a comparison of the maps in both sets.
