## Border Literatures: About the Panellists

*Border Literatures* is a reading and conversation series designed to share diverse literary perspectives on the experience of living in, crossing through, and reflecting on the century that has passed since the partition of the island of Ireland.

Border Literatures was co-curated by The National Library of Ireland and Professor Nicholas Allen in association with the Willson Centre for Humanities and Arts at the University of Georgia. ### Opening Event Border Literatures: A Conversation 22<sup>nd</sup> of September 2021

In this event, we will open up the discussion with an exploration of how writers have shaped these ideas from their individual perspectives, in order to experience a range of literary representations of the border, from the historical to the contemporary.

#### Moderator: Nicholas Allen



Nicholas Allen holds an endowed professorship in the humanities at the University of Georgia, where he directs the Willson Center for Humanities and Arts. He is the author and editor of many books about Ireland, the most recent of which are *Archipelago: A Reader* (Lilliput, forthcoming September 2021, with Fiona Stafford) and Ireland, *Literature and the Coast: Seatangled* (Oxford, 2020).

#### Garrett Carr



Garrett Carr travelled Ireland's border creating maps that have been exhibited widely and he is also the curator of a touring cartography exhibition called Mapping Alternative Ulster. His book, *The Rule of the Land: Walking Ireland's Border* was published by Faber in 2017 and was a BBC Radio 4 Book of the Week. He is a Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing at Queen's University, Belfast.

### Dónal Hassett



Dónal Hassett is a Lecturer in French who teaches on topics relating to the history, the politics and the societies of France and the wider Francophone world. Originally from Dublin, he completed his doctorate on the legacies of the Great War in colonial Algeria at the European University Institute in Florence in June 2016. He has lived, studied and worked in France, Spain, Italy, the UK and Ireland and has also carried out research in Morocco and Algeria. His research focuses on the history of colonial rule and the legacies of conflict in the French Empire. As well as teaching about the history and politics of Francophone societies, he also leads a comparative course on migration, mobility, and borders in the contemporary world. His first monograph, *Mobilizing Memory: The Great War and the Language of Politics in Colonial Algeria, 1918-1939*, appeared in August 2019 with Oxford University Press.

### Kapka Kassabova



Kapka Kassabova is a poet and writer of narrative non-fiction. The exploration of place fuels her work which focuses on the intimate relationship between people and their environment. She is most recently the author of *Border* (Granta 2017) and the more biographical *To the Lake* (Granta 2020). These polyphonic works are set in different parts of the southern Balkans and enquire into how human destiny is shaped by geography and politics. Her work is translated into twenty languages. *Border* was awarded or shortlisted for many literary prizes in Europe, the UK and the USA. Her next book is *Elixir* (Cape 2022-2023). Kapka Kassabova grew up in Bulgaria, was university-educated in New Zealand, and since 2005 has lived in Scotland.

### Suchitra Vijayan



Suchitra Vijayan was born and raised in Madras, India. She is the author of *Midnight's Borders: A People's History of Modern India*. Her work has appeared in The Washington Post, GQ, The Boston Review, The Nation, and Foreign Policy. A Barrister by training, she previously worked for the United Nations war crimes tribunals in Yugoslavia and Rwanda before co-founding the Resettlement Legal Aid Project in Cairo, which gives legal aid to Iraqi refugees. She is an award-winning photographer, the founder and executive director of the Polis Project, a New York based hybrid research and journalism organization.

Liam McIlvanney was born in Scotland and studied at the universities of Glasgow and Oxford. He has written for numerous publications, including the *London Review of Books*, the *Times Literary Supplement* and the *Guardian*. His debut, *Burns the Radical*, won the Saltire First Book Award, and *Where the Dead Men Go*, won the Ngaio Marsh Award for Best Crime Novel. His most recent book, *The Quaker*, won the 2018 McIlvanney Prize for Scottish Crime Book of the Year. He is Stuart Professor of Scottish Studies at the University of Otago, New Zealand. He lives in Dunedin with his wife and four sons.

### Elizabeth Mannion



Elizabeth Mannion's research focuses on theatre and an interdisciplinary range of Irish studies, from revivalist drama to contemporary crime fiction. She is the co-editor, with Brian Cliff, of the Edgar Award-nominated *Guilt Rules All: Irish Mystery, Detective, and Crime Fiction* (2020); editor of *The Contemporary Irish Detective Novel* (2016); and the author of *The Urban Plays of the Early Abbey Theatre* (2014). Her research has appeared in numerous journals and anthologies, most recently *Bernard Shaw and the Making of Modern Ireland* (2020). Beth teaches at the City University of New York and is currently working on a book that examines the theatre of Wallace Shawn.

Neil Hegarty grew up in Derry. His novels include *The Jewel*, published in 2019; and *Inch Levels*, which was shortlisted for the Kerry Group Novel of the Year award in 2017.

Other titles include *Frost: That Was the Life That Was*, a biography of David Frost; and *The Story of Ireland*, which accompanies a BBC-RTE television history of Ireland. His essays and short fiction have appeared in the *Dublin Review*, *Stinging Fly*, *Tangerine* and elsewhere; and he is a regular literary reviewer for the *Irish Times* and *Dublin Review of Books*. Her latest book *Edith: A Novel* – about Edith Somerville – will be published early next year. Prizes include the Royal Society of Literature's V.S. Pritchett Prize and a Hennessy Literary Award. She writes a weekly current affairs column for the Irish Independent and has been named National Newspapers of Ireland commentator of the year. Martina is the first holder of a PhD in literary practice from Trinity College Dublin. With a Masters in Peace and Conflict Studies and a career in Community Relations, her writing often touches on diversity, reconciliation, borders and the legacy of the Troubles today. Dr Dawn Miranda Sherratt-Bado is Visiting Scholar in the Institute of Irish Studies at Queen's University Belfast. She specialises in Global Irish Studies, with a focus on women writers. Dawn's current research is based at the National Library of Ireland jointly funded by the Royal Irish Academy and Notre Dame University. She has previously received Arts Council of Northern Ireland awards for her literary and cultural criticism. Dawn is co-editor of the landmark anthology *Female Lines: New Writing by Women from Northern Ireland* (Dublin: New Island Books, 2017). Her recent work has appeared in *Irish Studies Review*, *Review of Irish Studies in Europe*, *The Literary Review*, *Breac*, *Open Library of Humanities*, *The Stinging Fly*, and *Sunday Business Post*. She is a frequent contributor to the *Dublin Review of Books* and *The Irish Times*, and she has appeared on RTÉ Radio and BBC Radio Ulster to discuss her work.
