EXPLORING EPHEMERA

An Introduction to Postering in Public Spaces

Teacher's Guide

This resource uses items from the NLI collection to explore ephemera—what it is, how street culture contributes to it and how to analyse its content.

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Introduction

Ephemera is all around us whether we process it as such or not. These can relay a surprising amount of information. When something temporary is kept and preserved, we can understand more about the motivations and interests of the person. A train ticket stub from 70 years ago can provide information about inflation. Political posters give context about popular references and opinions surrounding a topic of election.

Students should be able to analyse and contextualise these sources and recognise how they operate in the world around them. This resource will introduce students to ephemera as historical evidence. This guide includes curriculum links as well as helpful resources.
